Duke of Edinburgh Expeditions

In 1956, HRH Prince Philip launched a pilot for The Duke of Edinburgh's (DofE) Award. Today, the programme is available to any young person aged 14 to 24, with the mission of inspiring, guiding and supporting young people in their self-development and recognising their achievements. Young people choose a challenge under each section of the Award: Volunteering, Physical, Skills, Expedition and, for Gold participants only, Residential. These activities, undertaken over an extended period of time, lead to a Bronze, Silver or Gold Award.

At Heritage, the Expedition sections of the Bronze and Silver Awards are delivered as part of our Outdoor Education Programme. During Senior Camp this year, Year 9 DofE participants finished their Bronze Qualifying Expedition while the Year 10s successfully completed their Silver Practice Expedition. Year 11s completed their Silver Qualifying Expedition in late June in the Shropshire Hills, walking from near Pontesbury to Llanfair Waterdine on the Welsh border. The expedition included medieval towns like Bishop's Castle and Clun. as well as sections of Offa's Dyke. Well done to all of those pupils who participated in this year's Expeditions.

11s who assisted with the Senior Sports Day. The final results are shown above, but regardless of the numbers, all of our young athletes should be commended for giving their best effort to score points for their house. Note that the results from Sports Day have been added to our 'House Shield' table, which includes all of the inter-house competitions played throughout the school year. Each house earned 25 points for winning a competition, 15 points for second place, 10 for third and 5 for fourth. The final results yielded a victory for the Blue team as overall champions (514 points), followed by Red (394), Green (366) and Yellow (320). In Years 5 through 8, our annual class plays give each child the chance to experience the excitement and sense of achievement that comes from seeing a production through from beginning to end. This term, Year 6 put on a splendid performance of Shakespeare's A Midsummer Night's Dream. Demonstrating the play's theme of chaos and disorder in real time, the production was presented with more than its share of challenges, including illness, a lost voice, and a (literal) last-minute cast substitution. However, the many weeks of rehearsal during Enrichment sessions and an after-school Drama Club prepared the children well and culminated in a remarkable evening show for families in Panton Hall. In praising the class's performance Mrs Burden remarked, 'This was not a children's



version of the play. This was Shakespeare; they were learning the poetry, the beauty of all that blank verse...all the loving and the madness and the mischief.' Reflections from Screen Free Week

From 13-19 June, many of our families joined in on the annual Heritage Screen Free week. Here is a summary of what we heard from those who participated, as well as those who didn't. Thank you to all of those who shared their perspectives.

 The most positive impact was reported by those families who approached the week as an opportunity to re-discover pursuits and activities that are often displaced by screens.

- Screen Free Week felt most difficult for working parents, especially for those with small children (who are less able to play independently) or with older children (who depend on screens to communicate with family and friends).
- For families who already impose strict screen limits, the impacts

were more minimal; they either didn't feel the need to join in or noticed little difference if they did.

- Children are (of course) all different; some naturally manage their time well on screens, others have more difficulty.
- 70% of those who responded to our questionnaire said they would participate next year. 17% said maybe, and 13% said they will not.

'During the pandemic, I had become dependent on screens to keep my children occupied while I was busy, and they had come to depend on it as their preferred form of entertainment. Having a reason to stop for a week helped me to see that my children can stay busy without screens, that I can endure their complaints of boredom, and that they are actually happiest when they are spending in-person time with family and friends, whether outside, playing games or just hanging out.'

'It was a revelation! I thought the kids would really kick back on Monday after school, but they didn't mention a computer through the week! We felt more spaciousness as a family since we didn't squash the playing or being together in the time between computer time and all the other things we have to do every evening.'

> 'It was great to have a holiday from screens. I think we talked more in the evenings, and after dinner it was lovely just to sit together reading/ painting/ knitting/ listening to music (on a record player no less!) - quite like stepping back in time!'

'We were pleased to take part and have the prompt to do away with the screens for one week. The children rediscovered a few toys and old books were dusted off for reading!'

'In term time, [our] infant/junior age children only get 1hr screen time per week anyway which is barely worth cutting out for the downtime it gives them and the positive shared activity.'

> 'As a family I think it did feel a little bit like a punishment (kids – no option of an hour of TV after dinner, me – no catching up on sports when the kids are in bed)... In hindsight, I think I should have planned a new 'thing' I might do instead of watching the TV.'

'We thought [participating in Screen Free Week] would be too difficult for our toddler; watching kids TV is very useful 'downtime', when they are low on energy. We plan to participate when everyone in the household is school-age.'

Independent Research Projects

During their time at Heritage, our pupils are encouraged to take advantage of various opportunities for self-directed learning. In Year 6, pupils complete an Independent Research Project, which is also optional for pupils in Year 8. In Year 9 the compulsory Independent Research Essay, complete with bibliography and footnotes, enables pupils to choose a topic and take their learning to deeper levels than can be achieved during lessons and homework time. This term, we saw some outstanding reports from our pupils on a wide variety of topics, from the sport of fishing to the Big Bang Theory to Rosa

Parks. In the final half-term, Year 6 presented their research questions and conclusions to Mr and Mrs Fletcher and Mrs Parkinson. And in Year 9, three pupils volunteered to present their reports to their classmates during the weekly Assembly. Isabella spoke about 'Alchemy: How it Evolved into Chemistry', examining some misconceptions about alchemy, looking at its beginnings, and studying how it evolved into chemistry. Toni asked 'How is Christian Hell portraved in Literature and Art?', which looked at the biblical depiction of hell, then moved on to Dante's description in the Inferno, and finally compared the

artistic portrayals found in Jan Van Eyck and Thomas Dowdeswell's paintings. Finally, Maisie presented her essay entitled 'The Skirt in Western Society: A Social History', examining the changing perceptions of clothing in society through time and across cultures, and relating it to changing concepts of gender. Each one did an outstanding job presenting what they had learned. We are pleased to see the hard work and passion that are reflected in all of our pupils' projects, and hope that the experience will encourage them in the future to apply the same rigour and enthusiasm to the questions that interest them most.

At a recent assembly for Infants and Juniors, Dr Stuart Creed came to speak to our pupils about Amazing Grace Pre & Primary School in Kisoro, Uganda. Amazing Grace and Heritage have a long standing relationship and, over the years, funds raised by Heritage have helped to pay for a new kitchen, new classrooms, accommodation improvements, toilets, solar powered lighting and more. Dr Creed, the UK Director of the school, described to the pupils what life is like for the children in Uganda.

He told them that many of children at Amazing Grace School are orphaned. The Sponsor a Child programme gives anyone the ability to cover a child's expenses for just £15 a month. This is enough to finance a child's accommodation during term times, along with three meals a day, basic medical care, full time schooling, and pastoral support. Career Assembly: STEM Entrepreneurship



This half-term, Seniors heard from Mrs Helena Frumson in an inspiring Career Assembly about STEM Entrepreneurship. Mrs Frumson, who works in the field of business development, has a passion for helping entrepreneurs turn their vision into a successful venture. Noting that the 'S' in STEM can include behavioral and social sciences, she pointed out that Mr and Mrs Fletcher are actually STEM entrepreneurs whose vision led to Heritage School! During the assembly, Mrs Frumson challenged the pupils to think like entrepreneurs by always looking for opportunities to improve things around them. She explained that this ability to see a world full of opportunity is actually a skill that can be cultivated; to recognise that there

are many opportunities for introducing an original idea, and to look at problems and challenges with a fresh set of eyes. However, the idea alone is not enough; to create a successful enterprise you must also be willing to listen to others. Resistance to taking input from other people will often prevent a business from taking off. Entrepreneurs are often driven by the love of creating something new. Mrs Frumson noted that, after achieving success, many successful entrepreneurs will often continue to look for opportunities to create and invent. Many thanks to Mrs Frumson for helping our pupils understand how successful businesses are created, and for encouraging them to think like entrepreneurs.

Hope's Friendship Garden

Congratulations to Year 5 pupil Hope, who was recently honoured with the Mayor's Volunteer for Cambridge Award for the creation of a community garden that she cultivates with young people on her local children's committee. In addition to many lovely plants and flowers, the garden also contains 'Anna's Tree', in memory of a young physiotherapist who died in a traffic accident on the Addenbrooke's roundabout last year. Presented by Councillor Daniel Lee, the award is 'in recognition of the outstanding voluntary service to the community of Cambridge during the Coronavirus Pandemic'. On 14th June, Heritage parents were invited to spend an evening at Panton Hall with esteemed wildlife artist Ian Loe, who shared his reflections on a life spent studying that most beautiful of insects, butterflies. The evening began with an opportunity for parents to mingle in the garden with Mr Loe and his wife Beryl, followed by an inspiring talk by the artist himself. In his engaging style, Mr Loe spoke passionately about a childhood spent watching butterflies and moths on his father's allotment (he even attempted to breed them, albeit unsuccessfully). This fascination grew into an adulthood of studying, drawing, and writing about Lepidoptera, as they are scientifically named. A teaching career eventually led him to

Zambia, where he persuaded a mining company to fund his books on Zambian wildlife. When he returned to the UK, he turned his artistic talents toward postage stamps, of which he has designed hundreds. A true artist in his own right, his work has been exhibited in galleries and museums including The Fitzwilliam. Mr Loe spoke also of his concern about the endangered position of many butterflies and moths, due to the destruction of habitat. 10% of the profits from the sale of his book. A Passion for Butterflies, will be donated to Butterfly Conservation. (Incidentally, he has donated a copy of this amazing book to Heritage School.)
